This combines two different data sets to produce a broad view of potential demand for older peoples' services from minority ethnic groups for the period 2008-2026. The over-65 social sector population for each four-year period is taken from Table 2. The distribution of population between ethnic groups in Column 1 is as identified in the 2005 Housing Needs Survey. The growth for each ethnic group is based on information the Worcestershire Older Age Group Projection, which extends to 2026. The projections have been extrapolated in different ways to give a range of possible demand. The table interprets changes over each four year period, in accordance with those projections, but based on two groupings: firstly the White British/ White Irish/ Other White figures, and then the figures for all other ethnic groups. The increase applied between for the first grouping is 12.5%, but all other ethnic groups have been grouped together at an average 15.4%.

The figures in **black** (on top) below show the projected population for each four-year point based on differential growth factors for different ethnic groupings. For example, the 'all other' factor of 15.4% has been applied to the 58 people in the Pakistani group at 2008, to produce 89 people in 2016.

The figures in **red** (below) show the projected population for each four-year point divided in the same ethnicity profile from the Housing Needs Survey. For example, assuming that the Pakistani population will remain at a constant 2.1% of the population, then 79 of the 2016 population would be from that grouping.
